There is an old saying - The trouble that troubles man is trouble. Job states, "Man that is born of woman, is of few days & full of troubles" (14:1).

We experience natural catastrophes, pain, disease, and death. There are moments in our lives when we ask the searching questions –

- "Why do the innocent suffer?"
- "Why do little children starve to death?"
- "Where was God when my son was dying?"
- "Where is God when I lost my job?"

Why doesn't God stop evil? In the USA every two hours a student commits suicide. Each year 30,000 people take their lives. We live in a world of pain, tears, and sorrow.

False Perceptions:

- 1. Suffering means God doesn't love me.
- 2. Suffering means I am a bad person.
- 3. Suffering means I must have no faith.

The Reality of Evil

If there is no God where did evil come from? Is there a Moral law?

What must exist for evil to exist? If there is no absolute, what is evil?

Can we affirm something is wrong without knowing what is right? How can we say something is bad if we can't prove what is good?

Evil is a by-product of that which is good. A bad relationship between the good.

Evil has no metaphysical independent existence. It is like blindness, a lack of sight, or rust in a car, or hole in a garment.

Evil does not question the existence of God but merely his operation.

We suffer because we sin.
We suffer because others sin.
We suffer because we live in a fallen world
We suffer because God allows us to make choices

God is too wise to make a mistake, too kind to be cruel.

There is no sorrow that God does not share.

There is no pain that he does not feel.

There are no tears that he does not bare.

There is no darkness he does not know

1. Trails can test our faith.

5. Trails can transform our character.

We are not alone in our pain Christ participated in our suffering. The Christian life is not without trouble it's too glorious to be easy.
